Welcome

From the Provincial Grand Master

Well, what a year it has been once again.

In 2020 your response to the Covid pandemic was magnificent and something we will be proud of for the rest of our lives. This desire to help others has continued throughout 2021. As you know these efforts, together with our new marketing and membership programmes which we started working on when I became Provincial Grand Master in 2017, and enabled by our information system HeliPAD, have delivered an additional 300 membership enquiries during this time over and above the number of applications to join we would normally receive.

Back in 2020 we demonstrated our new systems and processes to members of the UGLE marketing committee and I am delighted to say that they have now launched a similar programme of social media marketing which has delivered outstanding results.

There are some who will say that marketing in this way will bring in the wrong sort of people who might not share our values of decency and kindness to others. Indeed, I have heard this from some very senior masons. The catastrophic consequences of this tried and failed alternative, then limits admission to only our own relatively small circle of friends.

This new approach, pioneered by our team in Buckinghamshire, has captivated the interest of predominantly professional, enthusiastic, and kind individuals who are in the age group 25 to 40. This is an outstanding success which has never been delivered before.

On our B.I.G. Day in the Grand Temple on the 12th of September 2021 we initiated more new masons in a single day than has ever been undertaken in this country. This event captivated and inspired Lodges in our province to go forward again and initiations have been taking place everywhere in the last few months. In some Lodges there is a backlog of 9 or 10 ceremonies to get through. **At a recent meeting of Old Pals Lodge, 11 new initiates were in attendance, and they outnumbered everyone else.**

These are outstanding, unprecedented achievements and in 2022 we will go forward

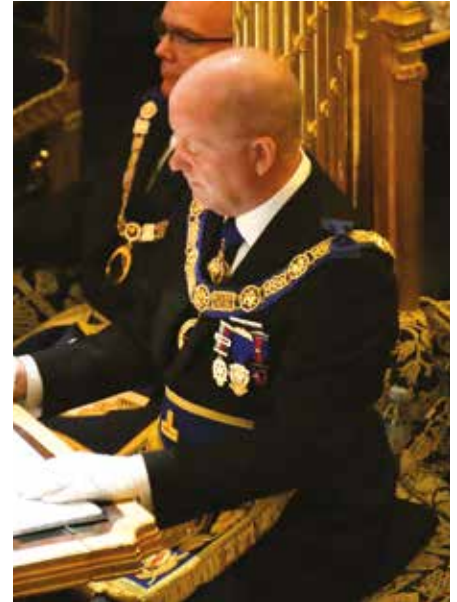
again with fresh ideas and great determination with our excellent team. I have asked John Keeble, our Past Grand Superintendent, with his background in training and development, to conduct a skills and aspirational survey in January to find the next outstanding team to take the province forward for the next five years.

We must not rest on our laurels, and we cannot ask the same individuals to operate at the level we have year after year. As you will have seen recently, exceptional individuals who have exceeded expectation in offices such as provincial Membership Officer, Mentor and Comms which have delivered results will be rewarded with significant promotions. I have been pleased to promote Simon Williams from Acting Steward to be our first Membership Officer, a role he has filled for 3 years before the official office was created. Grae Laws, after very successfully leading the Northeast Corner Club, is promoted to Communications Officer and John Palman will now replace Grae as NECC lead. Significant promotions have also been given to Francis McCabe and Damian Waite for their sustained effort in the provincial office over many years.

If you want to be part of this great future, then please complete the online survey when it comes out in January.

We are now in the final home run of our extended 2021 Festival for the Masonic Charitable Foundation. The MCF has done so much for people in need during the pandemic as well as keeping its normal operations running. As a response to Covid-19 they have dispersed great sums of money and have had reduced income and I ask you all to give one final push to do our very best to support them.

Preparations are well under way once again for a Festival Fortnight from 29th May to the 11th of June 2022 and we are asking all Lodges to rise to the challenge. For my part I shall be attempting to do as many initiations as possible in the first week for any Lodge that would like to take part up to 4 per day, anywhere in the province. The Deputy ProvGM will be delivering the Charge at each. I will then be taking part in a second canoe Marathon



on the Thames in the second week with the same team as before. This time we will invite individual Lodges to sponsor and buy a new boat and a member of that Lodge will then be entitled to take part in the challenge with us. We will donate all the boats to local canoeing groups as before. If you would like to take part in this or any event, please contact Mark Duncan who is running the Festival Fortnight.

On August 5th 2022 there will be a finale ball at the Double Tree at the MK Stadium which I hope all Lodges will attend and will feature film footage from all the events undertaken. Bill Smithson, our provincial DC, is taking the lead on this one and it will be a 'not to be missed' event even bigger than the last one.

I do hope that you have enjoyed your Christmas holidays and that you have been able to spend some time with your families and friends.

I think 2022 will be better than we ever hoped. With all the younger new members we will have our work cut out but let's not lose sight of the fact that new members are vulnerable. They will need your attention and support on a weekly basis until they establish their bond with their new group of friends. It will take them time to realise what a superb organisation they have joined. **Let's not take our eye off the ball.**

Brethren of Buckinghamshire, it seems that even after a global pandemic the resourceful, creative, and determined members of this province still enable us to come flying out of the other side. I consider it a privilege to be your Provincial Grand Master and I can assure you that my team and I will continue to work very hard on your behalf.

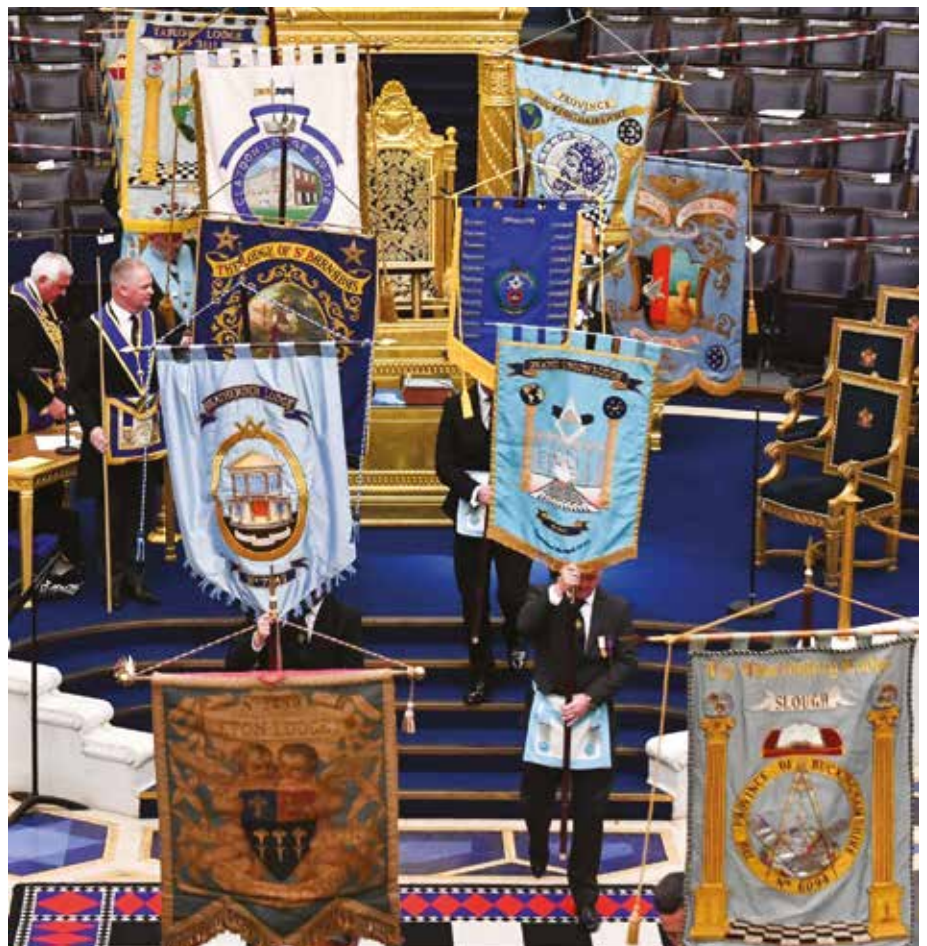

Welcome



The Grand Temple was buzzing.

Buckinghamshire Freemasons coming together is a B.I.G. Success.

In June 2017, a decision was made in Buckinghamshire that would culminate in an historic event which took place on the 12th September 2021. Our then new Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro John Clark, decided to make membership the number one focus for the new administration. The rationale was that by focusing on membership, the other elements of the province such a ritual, communications, marketing and mentoring would have to be in order too.

As such, the ProvGM set out to build a team of dedicated Buckinghamshire Freemasons, whose brief was simple - attract, recruit and retain members. It was decided that to attract young, enthusiastic candidates, the marketing and communications strategies had to reflect the behaviours of that group, while the membership and mentoring strategies should be standardised to ensure an optimal experience for all who used it.

The DepProvGM, VW Bro Hugh Douglas-Smith, was challenged to produce a digital platform that would manage and track the membership enquiries for the Province, but also allow for streamlined processing of membership data, executive reporting and the appointment and promotions procedures. The Provincial Marketing Officer, W Bro Phil Whitney, and the Provincial Communications

Officer, W Bro Matt Perkins, were tasked to produce a marketing and communications strategy that brought the good works, camaraderie and mystery of Freemasonry to the attention of the public. By taking a single communications message across social media, the Website and the Provincial magazine, Concord, it ensured that no matter where someone encountered Buckinghamshire Freemasons, they were receiving the same content presented in the same way. The development of a new provincial logo and inclusion of the recommendations from the survey on attitudes to Freemasonry were also key parts of this sea change. The formation of a 'landing page' (www.buckspgl.org/info) meant that all communications would have a call to action and direct interested parties

to a contact form that linked directly with the membership team.

In January 2020 the Membership officer, Bro Simon Williams, implemented a structured and detailed membership pathway, including methodology to allocate enquiries to suitable Lodges based on geography and availability. Little did Simon know that, instead of assessing, vetting and allocating candidates to Lodges, he would soon have to keep them interested for 18 months during the first ever suspension of Freemasonry in 300 years!

The changes to the marketing and communications strategies soon started to yield results, with improved engagement across all platforms and, most encouragingly, with the number of people filling in the contact form increasing from 1-2 per week to 1-2 per day. This was naturally a cause for celebration, with many prospective candidates stating they were interested in Freemasonry after seeing the good works that we do, but also the friendships that are built by the fraternity. The hard work of the whole team was starting to pay off by February 2020.

Then in March 2020 disaster struck and Freemasonry was suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Many of our brethren work in key worker roles and were at the front line of the COVID effort. Under the tireless leadership of the Provincial Executive, large numbers of Buckinghamshire Freemasons mobilised to provide urgent relief to those in need in the local communities.

Initiatives ensued such as:

- Donating tonnes of food to local food banks
- Providing hot meals to the elderly, vulnerable children and women's refuges
- Delivering PPE to NHS hospitals
- Delivering Pamper Packs and food to Carers
- Undertaking Marshalling Duties at NHS Vaccination Centres
- Providing Support within NHS Hospitals and Clinics.

These activities rightly attracted much attention on social media and in the local and national press. So, what was thought to be a disaster for our new recruitment initiative actually led to a further increase in the membership enquiries, with potential members seeing the benefits of our institution and wanting to join a community of like-minded people who want to bring good to their local communities. Membership enquiries went up, and the membership team set about creating a programme to engage these potential members and keep them interested until such a time as they could be initiated. This included zoom calls, family quiz evenings and virtual pub nights which proved very popular with all.

As the lockdown persisted, the membership enquiries mounted up. With over 200 candidates processed through Provincial channels plus Lodges own recruitment effort, over 300 candidates were awaiting initiation, with many having waited over a year to join because of the lockdowns.

Buckinghamshire now had a unique problem; What are we going to do with everyone? The Provincial Grand Master had a solution. He asked the Rulers to allow him to initiate as many of the candidates as possible in Freemasons' Hall and he was met with a great wave of support. The Grand Master gave a dispensation to meet on a Sunday as this was the only day of the week when

the whole of Freemasons' Hall would be available for use. In itself, this was historic as Freemasons cannot usually meet on a Sunday and the Buckinghamshire Initiations at Grand Lodge Day was born, affectionately known as B.I.G.

The Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies, W Bro Bill Smithson assembled a team and the planning began with less than 12 weeks to go. A monumental effort from the membership and communications teams meant that engagement with the potential members was huge, with a final social barbecue being organised in order to push the number of candidates booked in to 103.

The Day Arrives

Sunday the 12th September 2021 was an historic day for Freemasonry. Freemasons' Hall played host to an unprecedented event for the Freemasons in Buckinghamshire.

Over 100 candidates had booked in to be initiated into Freemasonry in a single day.

The Grand Master, HRH Duke of Kent, had given a dispensation during the period to allow a meeting to take place on a Sunday.

The day started early for both Freemasons and the Candidates alike. As day broke, they boarded all sorts of transport to get to the event bright and early. All the temples were set up and the Provincial Grand Lodge was opened at 09:30 so that the officers from the 'lost year' of the pandemic had their opportunity to perform their roles in the Grand Temple. At 10:30 the formalities of the day began and the initiates were swiftly gathered in their respective Lodge rooms. Some Lodges were initiating 4, 5 or even 6 candidates and were calling off during the

day for refreshments. The day ran smoothly with a lovely lunchtime festive board in the Gallery Suite for those Lodges initiating in the morning sessions. After lunch, the Lodges continued to initiate their own candidates, with visitors there to increase the support for every Lodge.

Entertainment During the Day and Night

During the day, the brethren were entertained by a harpist and a saxophonist.

The beautiful new Cafe in Freemasons Hall was ideal for the provision of much needed refreshment. It was also an ideal location for brethren and candidates from all over Buckinghamshire to meet and update each other on news.

At 15:30, everyone gathered in the Grand Temple for the main event of the day. Marcellians Lodge 4450 were initiating their candidate in the Grand Temple, with 619 masons staying all day to witness it, and the Provincial Grand Master in the Chair!

It was a flawless ceremony with the Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies acting as Junior Deacon. Once the newly installed candidate retired from the Lodge, 88 of the new initiates who had stayed to

the very end, took to the floor to receive the Charge on Initiation with their new Brothers. The sight of nearly 90 entered apprentices on the floor of Grand Lodge was an unforgettable experience.

The charge was given in spectacular fashion by the Deputy Provincial Grand Master, VW Bro Hugh Douglas-Smith. There was then a most enlightening demonstration of the First Degree Tracing board before the Lodge was closed. Before the processions out, singer Jenny Ball serenaded the crowd from the balcony of the Grand Temple.

The evening meal, known as a Festive Board to masons, took place both in the Vestibule and the Gallery Suites and the exquisite food, wine and entertainment made for a most enjoyable day.

In summary, the B.I.G Day was one that will stay in the memory of all that attended. Especially the newly-made freemasons, who are now members of a very special group, as an event like this is unlikely to ever happen again. And of course, we still have 150 candidates to initiate, not to mention the second and third degree ceremonies to do. Perhaps another BIG 3rd event is in order?...

Terrestrial and Celestial Globes

A pair of globes, each surmounting a column, are a central part of the symbolism Masons use to decorate their Lodges. The celestial globe is symbolically seen as the spiritual part of human nature and the terrestrial globe the material side.

In the past, a Lodge would usually have two six-foot columns, with nine or twelve-inch diameter globes, with smaller versions on the Wardens' columns. Usually, one column will have a simple Ionic or Doric capital and the other a Corinthian one. Such globes, either in miniature or full size, were sometimes painted showing the continents on the terrestrial world globe and the stars on the celestial globe.

Contemplating these bodies, we are inspired to encourage the study of Astronomy, Geography, and Navigation and their associated arts. They also denote the universality of Freemasonry, teaching us that a Freemason's charity should be equally as extensive.



The terrestrial globe displays the entire surface of the earth. All nations are represented, with none given any unnatural emphasis, unlike some other globes. Thus

symbolically including the entire population of the earth all on the same level.

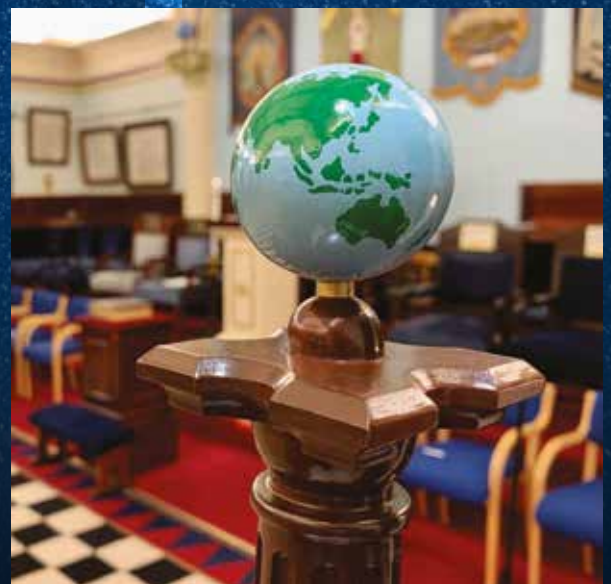


The celestial globe displays the stars in the heavens which are numerous. Every person possesses a unique combination of religious, social, political and

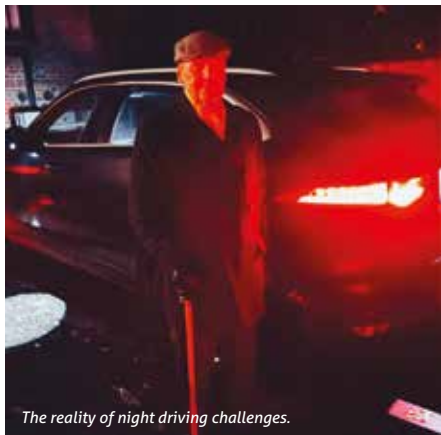
racial characteristics, and such individuals are as numerous as the stars that one can see.

Contrary to popular belief, the celestial and terrestrial globes were not present on the two columns which adorned the porchway to King Solomon's Temple. How could they be, given that at that time people believed the earth to be flat! It is likely they were originally 'bowl shaped' as the Hebrew

word 'Goolot' (plural), or 'Goolah' (singular) means globes, bowls or vessels, and were confused in translation. An Apron circa 1810 shows the two pillars topped by bowls and not spheres. The suggestion is that what we see now is 'artistic license'.



GIVING FREEMASONRY A LIFT



The reality of night driving challenges.

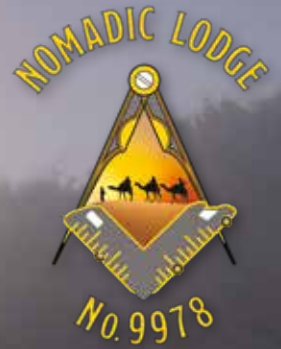
those taking part said they would not have missed it. They would, in turn, like to thank the organisers and the other Widows Sons chapters who supported them on various legs of their journey.

The other has taken charge of the Information Technology within the Office, configuring those back end systems on which we have come to rely and providing expert advice and support to everyone who uses it.

After an introduction detailing the additional history of these two brothers, VW Bro Hugh finally revealed them as W Bro Francis McCabe of Bretham Lodge 4980 as well as Lily Lodge of Richmond 820 and a founder of the Buckinghamshire Motorcycle Lodge 9926. W Bro Francis was appointed as an Acting ProvSGD in 2013 and then promoted to PPGSwdB in 2018. On Saturday, his tremendous efforts and assistance were rewarded with an immediate promotion to PPJGW.

W Bro Damian Waite, hailing from his native New Zealand, has been a Buckinghamshire mason for 15 years. A member of Herschel Lodge 1894 and a key player in the establishment of the Provincial Active Officers Lodge, Addington 2683. He was awarded a first appointment as Acting Prov AGDC in 2018, and today was promoted to PPGSuptWks.

To their obvious surprise and to the delight of a full temple of brethren who were rapturous in their applause, Francis and Damian were congratulated by the Deputy Provincial Grand Master. It has been an ongoing theme that the current Executive recognise and reward those who are delivering results in the operation of the Province to the enjoyment and benefit of all members.

It seemed as if the applause of these two completely unexpected promotions in the field were still echoing around the walls of the Slough centre on Monday, when the temple was again filled close to capacity by the Buckinghamshire Provincial Grand Stewards' Lodge 9222. And as if Saturday had not been sufficient, in front of a sea of red aprons, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master again called out one of the newly appointed Provincial Grand Stewards and on the direction of the Provincial Grand Master carried out a further promotion in the field.

By way of introduction, VW Bro Hugh explained that the background to this appointment made history in so many ways. As a Province, two years ago, Buckinghamshire typically received between 10 and 15 enquiries from potential Initiates through the website. These resulted in a few new members here and there but not enough to reverse the overall membership decline freemasonry had been experiencing. At the beginning of 2020, a new and very enthusiastic Brother, Simon Williams, who had only been Raised three years earlier was asked to take over the Provincial Membership Enquiry team. This coupled with a new strategy, which included Facebook advertising, was put in place and went live on the 9th March 2020.

Enquiries jumped immediately with an incredible total of 98 in the remainder of

March. In April this figure increased to 133 and has continued through to today.

However, at the same time the world was becoming aware of Covid and just as these enquiries came in, the country locked down and Freemasonry was temporarily suspended. Faced now with the challenge of not just contacting and interviewing these contacts, they had to be kept interested until such time as meetings could resume. Bro Simon assembled a team and led the way in developing and implementing a process which culminated in history being made on the 12th of September when more than 100 of these enquirers were booked into Lodges at Great Queen Street for the big day of Initiations.

What exemplifies this effort all the more is the sheer quantity of work undertaken. Since March 2020, there have been in excess of 1000 enquiries with more than 200 potential candidates passed to Lodges. Buckinghamshire has established itself as the leading Province in the country for addressing membership.

In recognition of all of this work, at the Provincial Grand Lodge meeting in October, Bro Simon was rewarded with the rank of Provincial Grand Steward, his apron was rosetted as he has only recently been invested as JW in Iver Lodge and as such is yet to reach the Chair. Two weeks after the Provincial Meeting, Bro Simon made history again with a promotion in the field to being the first Acting Provincial Grand Membership officer, a new appointment which has now been filled by the brother who has set the standard for Freemasonry and demonstrated that this wonderful fraternity really does have a future in the modern world.

To the undoubted amusement of all who were present, VW Bro. Hugh also pointed out that whilst Bro. Simon would be entitled to wear his coveted red apron forever, when on Stewards' duty, he has also made history in the Province for being the shortest serving Provincial Grand Steward we have ever had; just 14 days.

To Francis, Damian and Simon, you have demonstrated huge commitment and dedication to ensuring the continued enjoyment of all our members and it is hoped that you will enjoy your new preferments and the recognition that they bring whilst you continue your efforts. I am confident that as these surprise appointments occur, our members can be sure that work to support the Province and its work does not go unnoticed.

Why did you become a Freemason?

In March 2009 I responded to a medical incident at a place called Eliot Hall which I had never heard about. I was told someone would meet me at Lloyds Bank because they said I would never find the Hall. Even though I had lived in Winslow for 25 years I did not know of Elliott Hall.

There was a strange man dressed in Black waiting at the bank, he escorted me to the Hall down a side path to a door in the wall.

It was later that I found out this was a Masonic Lodge. This was to be the start in my journey into Freemasonry. Sometime later I met up with a good friend Bob Hodge, who said he saw me that night but I did not know he was a Freemason. It was Bob who introduced me to Freemasonry and I was Initiated in July 2009.

What is First Responders about?

Communities First Responder (CFR) are all volunteers who live and work within their local communities. They are trained by South Central Ambulance Services to respond to life threatening medical emergencies.

Types of Incidents CFR are trained to attend are cardiac arrests, breathing difficulties, chest pains, diabetic emergencies, trauma, burns.

I have been a CFR since 2007.

Why did you become a CFR?

I had always been involved with the Fire or Ambulance services since I was 18 years old. Becoming a First Responder allowed me to get involved with and support my local community.

How does it support the community?

CFR are the first people on the scene of medical emergencies, because they live in their communities. They tend to get on site prior to the arrival of the ambulance. Due to the training that they have had they can start treatment, which in cardiac arrest saves lives.



Has your lodge supported this project?

Predominantly most CFR use their own cars. On one occasion when I was having a coffee in the Bell Hotel with a couple of Brethren from Eliot Hall they asked, 'could the Freemasons help and would a Community Response Vehicle help you?'. All I could do was sit there with a big smile on my face - I said yes!



All the lodges and side degrees from Eliot & Yeomanry Halls were contacted to see if they would help. Everyone stepped up to the mark and contributed with generous donations and this was price matched with the BMCF.

In April 2015 we were presented with the First Responder Vehicle. It was even liveried with the Province of Buckinghamshire logo.

This vehicle was so successful as it was responding to medical emergencies daily and helping so many people in the local community. Most importantly saving the lives of those who were suffering a cardiac arrest.



The Province of Buckinghamshire, having heard of the number of incidents that the vehicle was responding to, decided to buy another two vehicles in 2017.

In 2018 the Lodges at Eliot Hall again stepped up to the plate and supported the purchase of a replacement and the 2015 vehicle went to support another first responder scheme.

What about COVID?

CFR's were on the front line when COVID struck, from March 2020 to July 2021. I was on call for 412 days and the vehicle responded to 929 callouts, which included 395 breathing difficulties plus 46 cardiac arrests.

Can you give me an example of a call out?

Only the other day a lovely lady fell over. I was called to this incident but could not get in because she had fallen behind the front door, but she was fine.

So next I had to call fire brigade because they had permission to gain entry. Having gained entry, I checked her over and got her into her front room.

I asked if there was anything else, she said "can I have a cup of tea and a bit of toast?"

As I was leaving she really made me smile when she said, "It's just as well that the firemen were here as I did not know my house was on fire".

But the one I will always remember is probably my best life saved to date. I was called to Lloyds Bank to a baby not breathing and in respiratory arrest.

I went to the room where Zac was being held by a very distraught mum with grandad looking on. Zac was blue so I took him off mum and gave rescue breaths and on the fourth breath in he started to respond. He was blue lighted to hospital.

I received a lovely box of chocolates from his mum a week later after she found out where I lived. I have a photo taken with Zac every year at Winslow show.

The ambulance service is always looking for CFR to support their local community.

Currently, support is needed in High Wycombe, Aylesbury, Milton Keynes, Olney, Newport Pagnell, Chesham, Denham and the Chalfonts. I am a coordinator looking after 8 CFRs within this area.

The Journey

LODGE OF CONCORDE

When I was asked to join Lodge of Concorde and to assist in making it an 'Aviation Interest' Lodge, little did I know just how far we would be able to push the envelope and do things a little differently. Concorde has a long association with Concorde the aircraft and so theming it around aviation seemed a logical step.

Taking inspiration from other themed Lodges, the cuffs worn by the Master and Wardens were replaced with black versions having gold braid to signify the Captain, Senior and First Officers. Some recorded announcements were created to be played at the Lodge which further set the atmosphere and demonstrated there was a theme.

Then, as the lockdown eased, the Lodge Initiated four new candidates at B.I.G. and preparations were started for my Installation. I had thought for a long time that conducting the meeting on board an aircraft would seem fitting, even though a logistical nightmare, but the idea was born. Discussions took place, research was carried out and through a contact of Phil Witney, the idea of using an aircraft filmset seemed like the perfect solution.

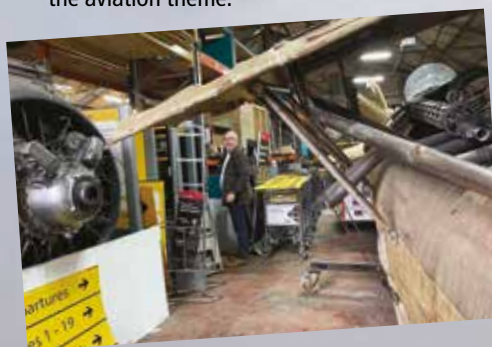
As the meeting approached and preparations got underway the reality, and in many ways the impossibility of the idea, started to come to the fore. Aircraft traditionally have seats laid out in rows which make it almost impossible to conduct a Lodge meeting with floor working. An alternative of using a cargo plane set with an empty cargo area and fold down seats along either side of the fuselage was promising, but the reality of a mid-December meeting in a hanger with no heating was not practical.

By this time, my enthusiasm to get lots of visitors to the meeting that had been promising the concept of a 'meeting on a plane', it was hard to roll back from the expectation that had been set. So with a bit of brainstorming the concept of holding a standard meeting in a temple, but dining on a mock-up of an aircraft started to take shape.

Lodge of Concorde meets at Beaconsfield, but the tall ceilings of the dining room and shape of the rooms did not really lend themselves to what was planned so a dispensation was arranged to move the installation meeting to the Slough Centre. Here the large dining room offered a near perfect environment and props were chosen, plans concocted and invites sent out.

Lee, the caterer at Slough was approached and immediately jumped in with full enthusiasm and great ideas of how to further theme the dining. The plan was to arrange the dining room into an aircraft setting with a centre aisle and everyone seated in rows. The waitresses would dress up and serve from trollies with the meals put on trays. Suddenly things were starting to look plausible.

With enormous assistance from Phil Witney and his very accommodating friend at Shoot Aviation, it was arranged for side panels from the inside of a passenger jet to be borrowed to line the dining room walls. Some photography and large printing provided images of the backs of seats with the airline fold down tray and headrest video screen to further enhance the effect of the aviation theme.



Word started to spread and the anticipation heightened by arranging for boarding cards to be sent to everyone attending the day before the meeting. In true airline fashion, although completely unplanned at the last minute the meeting had to be delayed by 24 hours to accommodate myself as Master Elect testing positive for Covid and only emerging from forced isolation the day after the original meeting date.

On the day, an early start to collect the necessary props from the airfield and then set about building the 'set' in the dining room. The bar was transformed into a departure lounge with signage which seems to originate from a host of international airports and sporting very much a, last millennium retro look. There was even a carry on bag size gauge to ensure no grand officer tried to get in with an oversized regalia case, and of course, just as you see at real airports, there were a few who tried!

The construction took a full day but each piece was carefully manoeuvred into position and secured until the full metal gantry was complete.

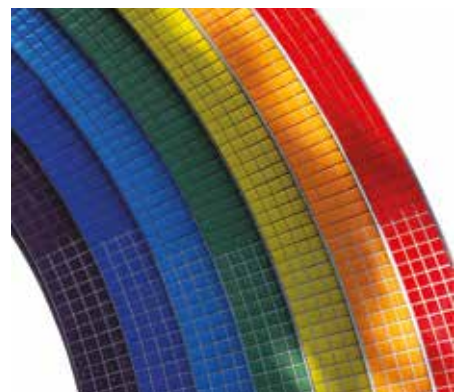
The following week, Philip and Isobel Blacklaw, along with

The provision of basic refreshments seems so little but Samantha said that it meant so much to the staff.

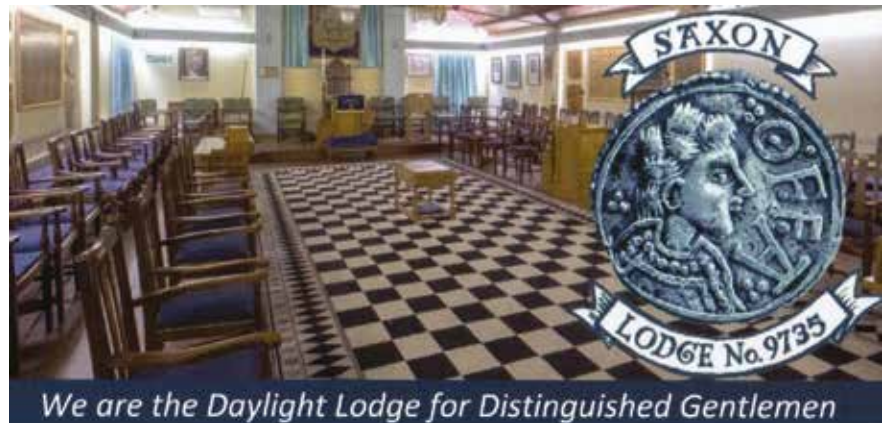
DAYLIGHT LODGE IN WINSLOW BUCKINGHAMSHIRE

Too many candidates - a great problem to solve

B.I.G. celebrated the combined efforts of the Membership and Marketing activities but it was not all plain sailing!

As the membership team started to see enquiries from the marketing teams advertising campaigns it was very apparent that spreadsheets and Post-it notes were not going to be sufficient to manage what became a huge data management problem. The online membership management system used by Buckinghamshire (HeliPAD) was extended to track and report back to both the membership team and Executive every aspect of each enquiry and the performance of everyone within the team.

With this, different adverts could be tested against each other to see what generated the best results, then when enquiries came in, they could be distributed amongst team members for follow up, but on allocation it could be seen who was becoming overloaded and steps taken to ensure nothing was lost. Finally when it came to placing a candidate with a Lodge, the system automated the process and made decisions based on their stated interests, the more convenient centres, the most suitable days of the week and their age



compared to the age of members in the prospective Lodge.

As candidates were sent to Lodges, they continued to be tracked to ensure no one was forgotten and also that no Lodge was swamped with just too many candidates to deal with. The tracking system doesn't stop with their Initiation, it tracks them right through to the Chair of the Lodge and reports to the Mentoring and Membership Pathway teams to ensure that once in, these new candidates are retained.

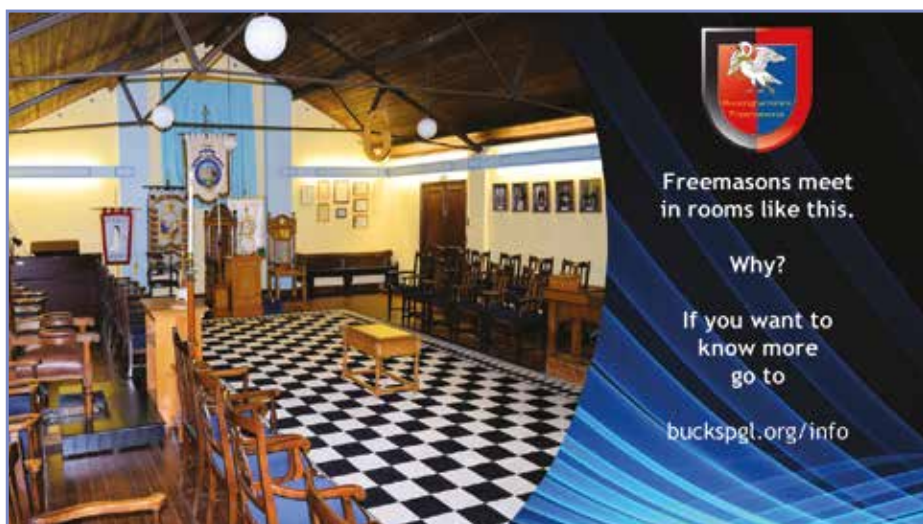
In Buckinghamshire we have been very lucky to have brought together teams of highly motivated and skilled members who have all worked together to a common goal. By ensuring that each team member, and the recipient Lodges, had easy access to the information they

needed in a single place, we were able to eliminate duplication and wasted effort.

What is more the continual evaluation of every step has allowed us to tune both the process and the advertising to ensure the best possible results.

What has become very evident is the attraction to a younger audience. Our Lodges typically have an average age of members in the early 60s. Traditional recruitment drives through existing members, tend to attract more old members. There is nothing wrong with that, but it does not address the problem of an aging membership that constantly needs to be replaced. The marketing effort across social media has shown how that younger audiences can be captured and now it is our new Initiates who will be looking to bring in their friends and colleagues. Each one of them potentially reducing the average age of members in our Lodges and thereby increasing those Lodges sustainability.

The buzz and enthusiasm from the B.I.G. candidates is infectious, these new members are excited and want to get on with their Passings and Raisings. This in turns drives interest with existing members who now see the potential of more ceremonies and new blood coming into their Lodges, the passion for freemasonry is returning. Couple that with the easing of lockdown and the future for Freemasonry is looking very bright.
